Today we were joined by **Karen Springmeier** from **Finger Lakes Workforce Development**. The mission of the Finger Lakes Workforce is to improve the economic well-being of job seekers and employers in the region by aligning human potential with opportunities in the workplace. The Workforce agency covers Wayne, Ontario, Seneca, and Yates counties.

There are five Finger Lakes Works centers, one in each of the counties they serve and another one in Geneva. The Centers have workshops, education and training to help job seekers find a position. In addition to these centers, FLWorks also holds various job fairs for youth and adults as well as a hands on Career Exploration Event for skilled trades.
