# Program

Charlie Bauder shared information about the Student Loan Program

- Along with Charlie the committee includes Jerry Forcier, John Watson, Dave Cook, Susie Flick, and Bob McFadden
- The program is the Club's oldest community service program. It started in 1923.
- It was established to provide interest-free loans to seniors at Geneva and DeSales High Schools.
- In the 1980s a donation of \$70,000 came from the estate of Judge Nathan Laphman and in the 1990s Michael Michaels donated \$10,000. Both men received loans through the program. Mickey Peters also oversaw the program's investment portfolio. Through these gifts and investments, the loan fund has grown.
- Over the past 30 years 680 loans have been awarded (totaling \$726,400) and the investment portfolio has grown from \$94,170 to \$345,452. At the end of 2023 the outstanding loan balance was \$200,725.
- Currently there are 41 people in repayment and 26 borrowers still in school.
- Under the program Geneva High seniors can borrow up to \$1,500 per year interest free while working towards a two- or four-year degree. If the student attends graduate school the loan repayment is deferred until they finish graduate school.
- Repayment begins three months after graduation with a minimum payment of \$100 a month.
- The program also honors two outstanding Geneva High Seniors with a Service Above Self Award of \$1,000. This year the name of the award has changed to The Geneva Rotary Club Paul E. Kirsch Memorial Award for Service Above Self and The Geneva Rotary Club Mary Luckern Memorial Award for Service Above Self. Over thirty years 94 Geneva and De Sales High School students have been recognized with this award.
- Loan requirements be a graduate of Geneva High School who is attending a 2 or 4 year college
- The check goes directly to the student not to the school. The committee found out that when the check went directly to the school the student's financial package was reduced.

- The busiest time for the committee is May to June.
- Over 101 years only a half a dozen loans have been written off.
- There is no limit to the number of loans that can be given.
- There has been a decline in applicants. Word needs to get out to the parents about the program.
